"...Here is what everyone saw on the outside: honor student, student council, captain of the cheerleading squad, and voted Best All-Around by my peers. This was the life I presented to everyone everyday.

"Here's the truth, on the inside I was empty, felt alone, unfulfilled, and eventually began to have suicidal thoughts. It was a life in severe turmoil, one of complete polar opposites, and on top of it all, no one knew.

"I had everyone, including my family and best friends, fooled. They saw 'best all-around,' but the truth was I was dying inside. My heart and soul ached for something to fill the void I felt in my life.

"I was driving to all-star cheerleading practice in Easley, SC and was at my breaking point. As I approached the bridge on Hwy 123 in Liberty, I decided this was it. I was either going over the bridge or not...

"Crying and screaming, I cried out to God, 'God help me! Please help me!' It was instantaneous, almost euphoric. At that exact second, I knew my life had changed. I had asked God into my life and he said yes."

He is a professor of kinesiology at the University of Alabama, and has been a mentor and traveling companion on several trips together to Latin American campuses:



"Simply identifying yourself as a Christian on a secular campus can yield a thrill or two. In my case I was once officially prohibited from even mentioning Christianity on my campus.

On the other hand, I have been commended by students and friends for doing that same thing. You never know what'll happen next!

"In my academic travels I have spoken to and worked with Christian college students in Costa Rica, the Philippines, Haiti, Switzerland, England, and even in the USA. I have been stranded away from home by 9-11, by a hurricane in Mexico with Steve Pogue and by a volcano in Iceland.

I've been surprised, thrilled, disappointed, and inspired! I can't wait to see what'll happen next time."
