Hers was one of many stories we have heard over the years of students who either found their faith strengthened, or found faith in Christ for the first time.

A Texas Woman's University student involved with Cru recently told Sarah "I could tell which of my professors were Christians – it was so obvious by how they treated their students."

It may have been a prof's remark in class; the jokes they didn't tell. Students seek out professors whose love for Christ and love for their students stands out. Profs we work with have told us of their conversations:

- A Univ of Oklahoma student stops by and says "Dr. T, I am not a student in your class, but I have heard that you are a Christian. I think you are the one who can help me" [dealing with a difficult family situation].
- A Univ of North Texas student meets for coffee with Dr. M for an entire semester and explores what it means to become a Christian.
- A Univ of North Texas student wrestles with the truthfulness of the Bible with "Dr. B" and eventually accepts Christ. He asked the professor to perform his baptismal service.

College students today are far more likely to see their faith grow in college than ever before – because of the presence of so many Christian student groups, more open discussion of spirituality and the visible presence of committed Christian professors.
