Michael Strauss spoke at North Texas last month. Strauss, professor at the University of Oklahoma, is known for his work in high-energy physics: a collaborator on the discovery of the Higgs Boson particle in 2012, and a frequent researcher at the CERN facility in Switzerland. He is also unapologetically a follower of Jesus Christ. Some highlights:

- The universe is finely tuned so many things "just happened" in the nanoseconds after the Big Bang in sequence that made life possible;
- All of these "coincidences" including our planet's remarkable characteristics make life on earth possible;
- The most plausible explanation is that there was some Cause behind it all; the universe is not a cosmic accident, but a product of a Creator.

...Of Excellent Work

The next night a panel of four faculty members spoke to a Christian student group on excellence: "Always remember that you represent the Lord Jesus Christ in your schoolwork," said Joseph Oppong, UNT professor of geography.

"Do your work with excellence, as unto the Lord, and don't be sloppy," he told them. "Attend every class; come prepared. Your work is the basis for your witness; you can't talk to your professor about Christ if you aren't being the very best student you can be."

One student commented afterward, "Tonight really helped me to see that it really is okay to pursue God's calling to graduate school, and to glorify God through being someone who takes their studies very seriously. I want to lead others to Christ, but even my work can be part of my witness."







Huntsville


