"I Became a Christian Two Months Ago"

Jin-Wan (*left*) came from China to pursue a doctorate in engineering. I met him at a seminar last month at one of our student conferences. "I recently became a Christian," he told me. 'It was after attending a Bible study nearly two years at my American university– and now I want to know Bible, so much Bible."

Jin-Wan heard Dr.Todd Primm (below,left) speak at that same conference about what it means to follow Christ in graduate school. Primm is a biology professor at Sam Houston State near Houston.

"There is a great opportunity to follow Christ and have an influence in academia," Todd said. "Grad school is really hard, but if you do well you can have a good job as a professor.

"The question is, 'Who will you do it for? For yourself and to make yourself look good, or to please Christ? Will you serve students or make them only serve your own success?' God wants you to please Him. I am a professor in part because I want to help nonChristian students know Christ."

"God Has Opened Doors Here"



Two weeks ago we helped organize "A Civil Dialogue: An Atheist and A Christian Professor." More than 50 high school students who attend North Texas' gifted and talented college came to hear two professors disagree, yet remain friends.

Nandika, the Christian, talked about how Jesus was at the center of her life and how it affected everything she did. Victor, the atheist, said he saw no reason for God – but admitted his regular attendance at synagogue because Judaism is a moral system he admires.

We hope programs such as this one lead to conversations between students who may have thought that Christians only preach and don't listen. And in listening, these believers do have opportunities to share about the One who came to us – to give forgiveness and new life.
