"I Was An Anomaly"

Two weeks ago Dr. Micah Green (Chemical Engineering - Texas A&M), spoke about sharing Christ on campus to the Christian Faculty Staff group at the University of North Texas via a video conference.

He explained that America's move to a postChristian culture mirrors that of Europe. When we begin to talk to others about Jesus we need to understand that.

"I went to M.I.T. for my doctorate, and discovered that being a Christian was a bit of an anomaly for some people. As believers we want to be able to reach out to all kinds of people and tell them about Jesus. People today may need more time, and more context, to understand who Jesus is – but they still need Him just as much."

"More Than Naval-Gazers"

Dr. Todd Primm, (Microbiology-Sam Houston State), looked at his campus this fall and saw a huge need.

"I talk to faculty who say that they are the only Christian in their department," Todd said this week. "They need a community of Christian professors where they are cared for and not alone," he said.

"Also, we want to be more than 'naval-gazers' in our fellowship: I believe God has called us here to help our colleagues know Christ, and to be available to talk to student about a relationship with Christ."

This week, Todd began gathering a group of faculty to lead in their fellowship and to gain effectiveness in their personal ministries.
