"I adopted a servant leadership like Jesus; I would ask my crews 'How can I help you succeed?' I would learn about each of them, and their families. It brought peace amidst the stress and isolation of life on a submarine."



Angus leads fund development for the College of Engineering at North Texas, and is one of the leaders of the Christian Faculty-Administrators group. "I apply those same skills from the military now at the university: active listening; showing people that I care. Outside the university, others are amazed that there are many committed Christians here; I meet many who are making a difference together."

Not Alone At Leyte



This October marks the 76th anniversary of the Battle of Leyte Gulf, considered the largest naval battle in history. Allied forces were vastly outgunned but prevailed because of the heroic actions of a handful of destroyer escorts (DE) – smaller boats not meant to face Japanese battleships on their own.

Naval historians consider it one of the finest examples of working together in the face of death. Some sailors lived to tell about it; one was Bob Rogers. After the war he returned to Ohio for college, married, moved to Indiana and raised a family. He passed away this summer at 97. He is Sarah's father. He spent his last few months in the home of Marti - Sarah's sister. His last earthly weekend included time with all three of his daughters, his son-in-laws and grandchildren (including some on Facetime) with prayers, singing and Scripture readings.
